
Head Students



At the start of the academic year, we were pleased to be able to bring DofE back to Longdendale. Year 9 students were all offered the opportunity to take part.

Fast forward a year and we have had a fantastic time supporting 26 students through their various elements of the award. Students have shown so many skills over the last 12 months, commitment, teamwork and resilience, especially during the expeditions with our lovely summer weather which consisted mainly of rain.

The award had four elements that the students are encouraged to complete within 12 months Volunteering, Physical, Skill and the expedition. The students have all engaged with all the elements and along the way picked up additional skills to help them in the future.

A number of students selected cooking for their skills and have shared some great looking examples on their eDofE pages, with some students making it a Come Dine with Me experience. The skills ranged from learning a new sport, learning to play an instrument, sign language and many more.

Through the award the students have also given back to the community with their volunteering. These range from helping at local food banks and animal rescue centres, to coaching in various sporting fields. Students have also volunteered to help elderly neighbours.

To prepare for the expedition students took part in a skills day in school which was followed by a practice walk. The walk certainly prepared the students for the heavy kit bags they had to carry, and took place on one of the only hot days we have had this year - the students certainly demonstrated endeavour and team work on this day.

Over the last couple of weekends, the students have completed their overnight expeditions. All students rose to the challenge and demonstrated their navigation skills over the 2 days along with their cooking skills. What stood out most was their support of each other, always supporting each other in their teams. We are really pleased to hear that some of the students are keen to move onto their silver awards next year.

At this point, I do need to thank all the staff that were involved over the year in getting the DofE up and running in school. As you can imagine we have had to start from scratch, fund raising for school kit, building resources and completing training to accompany the students on the expeditions. We have been in the fortunate position of having a team of 9 staff dedicate their time to supporting the students, without these staff this would have not been possible. Cumbria Trip

34 of our Year 9 and 10 geography students travelled to Castle Head in Cumbria in March where they undertook a range of outdoor activities including bush craft, rivers fieldwork, raft making, obstacle courses, hiking and camping.

This residential trip had a strong focus on team building exercises whilst gaining a fantastic outdoor experience of our Physical UK landscape.

Students investigated the River Eea from its source in the Lake District National Park to its mouth at Morecambe Bay. Working in small groups, students made measurements of the river features and all data was recorded. The students also discussed the surrounding land use and management of the river and had the opportunity to produce field sketches and examine the impact of a river on its surroundings.

The students experienced a fun, albeit a bit wet, night camping out whilst staying within the centre grounds. It was great to see the students getting involved in all the activities - well done to everyone and many thanks to the team of staff who facilitated the trip.



University of Oxford

On 2nd May a group of Year 10 students visited Corpus Christi University in Oxford. This was an exciting event and our students were immersed into student life at this prestigious university.

The day consisted of a tour around the city and a full campus tour including how lectures work. They also visited the different societies and considered the wider life of students. This raised aspiration for students post-16 choices and future career pathways.



ASFC Science XL

A group of Year 10 students took part in an XL Science event at Ashton Sixth Form College in May. The theme of the day was Chemistry, Biology and Geology, with students participating in workshops throughout the day.

Students extracted their own DNA and inserted this into jewellery during Biology. They then used molymods to construct different isomers of pentene in Chemistry and used this to look at the physical and chemical properties of isomers. Students also observed how climate can effect microfossil formation and how this can be used for evidence of climate change over time (linked to Geology).

Guest speaker Juliette Hilton, a Newcastle University MPharm Graduate spoke about 'The Antibiotic Resistance Crisis and the Role of the Pharmacist' which generated great discussion between the students.

The day gave everyone a fantastic insight into what it would be like to study these subjects at A Level and all students were an absolute credit to themselves and the school.









Teddy Bears' Picnic

6th June was our Teddy Bears' picnic. This was a fantastic event for both our students and the local community.

Our catering students made the picnic considering dietary needs of the toddlers and pre-schoolers as part of their qualification.

A group of students from Years 8-10 interested in working with nursery and early years children supported the event. We had messy play, art and crafts, sporting activities and paired reading to engage our visitors.

We also had a pop up book shop in which the funds raised support our library. A great afternoon was had by all.

Primary Science

In June we welcomed Year 5 students from Discovery Academy for a morning of science.

We looked at how different insulating materials would affect how fast a snowman melts.

The students were very enthusiastic and extremely polite. Thank you for visiting and well done Discovery!
